
The cockatoos were re-

Grants for Rural Women in Business

Armidale Regional Council has developed the 'Women in Business' grant program for female entrepreneurs living and operating businesses within the Armidale LGA, and in particular those living rurally, to take part in business and networking programs.

The program, which has been made possible through Federal Bushfire Recovery funding, will work in collaboration with a range of businesses to hold workshops and events aimed at growing and upskilling business women in regional and rural

These will teach local businesswomen about things such as social media activation, business budgeting, marketing, and business growth and development within these new times.

Expressions of Interest for the program will be assessed against a criteria developed by external local women from a community committee, with applications closing on Thursday 12 November.

The program is funded by the \$1.3-million of Federal Bushfire Recovery Funding, of which \$20,000 was allocated to the initiative

Push for upgrade of Guyra saleyards

A \$5 million to upgrade the Guyra and Armidale Livestock Selling Centres is being planned, with Armidale Regional Council developing a comprehensive plan to upgrade and modernise both complexes.

Under the plan the old timber sheep yards and loading races at the Guyra saleyards will be replaced with steel, and improvements would be made to internal and external roads to improve heavy-vehicle access. There are also plans to refurbish and expand the onsite amenities and kiosk facilities.

At Armidale, council wants to replace and extend the cattle holding yards, renew the cattle weighing scales, increase the amount of vehicle parking and refurbish amenities and offices. To meet environmental standards a system will be installed to harvest water from the large existing roof to be used in a truck wash

down reuse program, with solar panels also to be installed to lower power costs on site.

This week Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall met with Acting Deputy Premier Paul Toole, to push the case for money to be made available as a matter of urgency through one of two stimulus funds.

"Our region is renowned for breeding the highest quality beef and lamb in northern NSW, which is why we need selling facilities locally that will attract buyers and generate prices which reflect that excellence," Mr Marshall said.

"Both Armidale's cattle saleyards and the Guyra sheep yards desperately require upgrading, to ensure agents can deliver best sale methods, meet industry expectations and ensure animal welfare standards.

Mr Marshall said improved yards would mean more stock



presented for sale, increased buyer competition and higher prices for producers. He said that not only will these upgrades assist with increasing the number of stock which can be sold through the yards but they will also work to facilitate the shift towards online sales,

on platforms like Auction-sPlus.

The total cost of the upgrade works at Armidale and Guyra Livestock Selling Centres is \$4,998,000, which Mr Marshall is hoping will be entirely covered by the government.

Old car finds new home in car museum

Graham White's 1931 Model A Ford, is now part of the display in the Burgess Garage Car Museum. This is the story of the car as told by Graham.

This car came into my ownership in about 1962. It appeared in a property clearing sale at "Wiluna", Wandsworth, where it caught my eye. I then bought the car but am unsure now of the price I paid for it. The original owner was Billy Drabsch, a wellknown Guyra identity.

The car was garaged for some years until I got the desire to restore it, which I eventually did.

To properly restore a vintage car, all parts must be authentic. To this end, I joined the Model A Ford Club for advice on where to attain the necessary parts.

Commencing the restoration, I completely dismantled the whole car piece by piece, in what was formerly the carriage shed at the rear of the house at Eastern Plains. Carefully placing all the pieces bit by bit in separate containers ready for the re-build.

After the dismantle, I took the engine to a factory at Mascot where they were able to restore the white metal bearings and others. The five tyres and tubes came from New Zealand, the only place at that time from where the source them. All the upholstery and fabric work was obtained from an Armidale

works known as Blenko's; they did a first class job.

Putting all the pieces back in place was a long business and involved many evenings work out in the Eastern Plains carriage shed, rugged up against the cold. It was made possible with the generous and expert help of Don Williams and Bruce Moffatt.

The day came for start-up which went very well much to the surprise of some people and my family! My first journey with my wife, Mary, was down the main road in front of the Eastern Plains house. I drove the "Old Lady" around Guyra for many years and in various parades down the main street of Guyra, fully registered of course, on the special vintage car registration.

A highlight was driving my daughter from Eastern Plains to St Bartholomew's Church, Ollera on her wedding day.

With the passing of years, the time came to consider the next move. I recently sold the car to the owner of the Guyra Automotive Museum, Mr. Brian MacDonald, where it proudly occupies pride of place. I get tremendous enjoyment seeing it on display. It is fitting that it started life in Guyra and now rests in Guyra where I hope it will remain.

A workshop for anyone interested in wildlife rescue

An upcoming 1.5-day workshop to be held in Guyra will provide insights and information about bushfires and subsequent management of native animals.

The workshop will be held on October 29th and 30th at the Guyra Community Hall.

This course aims to provide the participant with basic knowledge on how to respond to the rescue of wildlife in the event of a bushfire. It is not intended to replace the need for veterinary treatment for animals affected by fire.

Facilitators for the workshop will be Dr Howard Ralph and Tania Duratovic. Dr Ralph is a veterinary surgeon, anaesthetist and doctor of medicine with qualifications in wildlife medicine and clinical forensics.

For over 40 years Dr Ralph

has practiced medicine, in humans and animals. He teaches various aspects of wildlife treatment and care around Australia. With his wife, Glenda, he established Southern Cross Wildlife Care which includes a purpose built wildlife treatment centre in the NSW Southern Tablelands.

Tania is a fauna ecologist and qualified veterinary nurse who also works at Southern Cross Wildlife Care. She has worked for over 20 years for the NSW Department of Planning, Industry & Environment on threatened species and now manages animal research ethics.

Small communities get a funding boost

Community facilities smaller communities throughout the Armidale Region will benefit from new funding arrangements, with council redirecting stimulus funding from both the State and Federal government.

Former Interim General Manager David Kerr, Acting General Manager John Ravner and Interim Administrator Viv May raised concerns about Council's allocation of stimulus funding because it disproportionally favoured the centres of Armidale and Guyra at the expense of the regional villages.

Interim Administrator Viv May said that drought, bushfires and now COVID have had a significant impact in smaller rural areas and they deserve a share of the funding on offer from the State and Federal governments. As a result, Mr May said funding is now being redirected to the villages.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce has welcomed the new funding arrangements.

The biggest allocation goes to Wollomombi who will receive a total \$240,000 for a new toilet block as well as a new children's playground.

"Our villages are entitled to have access to modern facilities just as much as the big centres in the New England," Mr Joyce

"As a former pupil of Woolbrook Primary School, I know what it means to grow up in a small community and how projects like this can deliver lasting benefits for local people.

"I'm pleased to see the needs of villages like Wollomombi, Ebor, Ben Lomond and others are being met, ensuring they receive their cut of infrastructure funding being provided by the Australian Government."

Other projects to receive support under council's reallocation of State and Federal funding include \$75,000 for a new playground at Wards Mistake, \$60,000 for painting and repairs to Ben Lomond railway station, \$40,000 for audio visual equip-

ment for Ben Lomond Hall, \$55,000 for a kitchen at Wongwibinda Hall, \$18,000 for fencing at Black Mountain Tennis Courts, as well as \$120,000 for village improvements at Ebor including church hall renovations and a bore at the sportsground.

From the Australian Government, Armidale Regional Coun-

cil has been provided \$1.03 million for bushfire related recovery projects, \$2 million for infrastructure projects through the Drought Communities Program and \$3.1 million under the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program to support local economies recover from the effects of COVID-19.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

October 14th - There was an increased penning of both sheep and lambs with 1,700 and 700 respectively. The quality of the lambs was fair to very good. The feature being some outstanding quality extra heavy weights.

Merino lambs were well supplied showing varying levels of finish and weight. The usual processors were in attendance, however restocker activity was minimal due to a lack of supply.

Market trends were generally dearer through the sale, in line with other recent Northern markets. Light and medium weight Crossbred lambs posted moderate improvement with some quality related price change in places. The heavy and extra heavy weight lambs posted the strongest improvement with quality and weight accounting for some of the increase.

There were varying trends through the sheep market, where quality and condition was mixed. Most classes sold on a firm to dearer trend. Both quality and weight contributed to some strong price improvement. Some of the plainer condition lightweight sheep sold to cheaper trends with little in the way of restocker competition.

Armidale Cattle Sale

October 15th - Numbers doubled from the previous sale. All categories were represented, although young cattle made up the bulk. There were some very good quality young cattle penned, alongside secondary lots. The condition of the offering continued its improvement with the majority showing the benefit of very good seasonal conditions. All the usual processors and feedlot orders were in place, with strong support from local restockers.

Strong demand from restockers and feedlotters resulted in the better quality yearling steers in all weight classes selling to a dearer trend. Strong gains were experienced for the light and medium weights to restock. The mixed quality nature of the offering resulted in the secondary cattle dropping averages in places.

A mostly good quality penning of heavy weight feeder steers saw well bred lines sell to a slightly dearer trend, breed and quality accounting for some price change. Yearling heifers to restock and feed followed similar trends with some of the better quality heifers showing improvement. Most however showing little but quality related price

There was a small but very well finished penning of heavy grown steers. They sold to dearer trends with strong gains experienced. Heavy heifers also sold to dearer trends. A good quality penning of well finished heavy weight movement has been with the cows sold to a dearer trend of as much 18 micron indicator now 100 as 21c/kg under increased competition. Heavy weight bulls attracted plenty of demand with the market trend dearer with a lift in some yield potential.

Weeklu wool sales

October 16th - Similar gains were made over both selling days this week with the Eastern Market indicator closing 95 cents higher, registering its second largest upmovement ward this calendar year. The broad based Indicators have climbed back to the pre July recess levels however it's a different story when individual micron indicators are looked it. The finer the micron the better the upward cents higher than the closing level leading into the July recess with the 21 micron indicator 100 cents lower over

the same period. In essence the recovery has been led by the finer types with a substantial price premium opening up over the course of the past few months. 28,545 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate shrinking to just 2.4% compared to the average for the season to date of 12.3%.

Major buyers included Endeavour Wool, Aust Merino Exporters and PJ Morris with the top 4 accounting for almost 50% of the Merino fleece purchases in the Northern region. The rise in the market has kicked up next week's national offering to an expected 34,093 bales.

CONOMIC RECOVERY LAN FOR AUSTRALIA



The Bowls Bandit

Water consumption goes on display

The region's water usage and dam level statistics are being published on Armidale Regional Council's website each week to showcase past and present water consumption behaviours and guide residents on our 'new normal' for water consumption. Residents can compare water usage and dam storage levels dating back to pre-drought conditions to help in ongoing water conservation efforts.

Armidale Regional Council Interim Administrator Viv May said while Council capably managed the emergency water conditions over the past year, the water supply still hasn't completely recovered and residents must continue to be vigilant.

"The comparisons are remarkable to see following last year's record low rainfall and run off into the dams," Mr May said. "While residents should be highly commended for their water saving efforts, I encourage the community to continue to keep up the great work and maintain the target consumption of 180 Litres per person per day," said Mr May.

Residents are reminded to

be mindful of their water usage, particularly with the increase in water charges.

Consultation will commence from next week on the development of a new Drought Management Plan. Key stakeholder sessions are being conducted next week in Armidale and Guyra followed by a community survey for the community to share their views on the future of water management in the Armidale region.

Council is aiming to adopt a new Drought Management Plan by the end of March 2021.
