The group rotations included using garden tools safely, collecting litter, weeding gardens, mulching garden beds, preparing the veggie patch, planting new shrubs and seedlings in




garden beds and pots, and mindfulness activities under the COLA.

and Rider combination.


On Sunday, Queensland turned on some great weather and the players gave a day of polocrosse at its best.



Rural Market Reports - Wool

The final sale of the 2023/24 season led to further downward pressure being placed on prices. In a pattern that has continued to repeat itself throughout the season, a three week 40 cent rise in the Eastern Market Indicator has now been followed up with a two week 28 cent decline.

Tuesday's opening was on a softer tone with the North-

ern Region Indicator declining by 16 cents.

A further 5 cent fall was recorded on Wednesday with a small hint of prices stabilising, particularly in the Western region where some gains were reported on individual micron indicators.

32,861 bales were sold nationally for the week, with the passed in rate climbing

to 11.5%. Major buyers included Tianyu, PJ Morris and Techwool.

This week's closing Eastern market indicator is 16 cents ahead of where the season opened. Movements of some individual micron categories do vary far greater than this with the 16.5 micron indicator down 10% and the 28 micron indicator up 25%.

It has been 12 months of relative overall stability for wool prices with both the upside and downside risk appearing to be capped in the current environment (see season chart).

The 2024/25 season commences next week with 36,653 bales expected to be on offer nationally.

It's o-FISH-al—Guyra Anglers Club is proud to announce that the Inclusive Fishing Pontoon, made by DockPRO, is in place at Tenth Dam.

Although installation of the pontoon is not quite *fin-ished*, it needs its concrete access apron laid, our official opening won't be too long a wait for our great community – watch this space.

The Club has had a long love affair with Tenth dam – from the original clean out of the dam, Club funded and completed with generous support of local businesses.

Further upgrades are possible with grants from the Department of Primary Industries Recreational Fishing Freshwater Trust Expenditure Committee (RFFTEC), and fantastic support from Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club.

The solar-powered Fountain Aerator, which helps maintain the health of the fish stocks in Tenth Dam, and the Inclusive Fishing Pontoon will open the world of fishing to more people.

These are examples of grants that are your fishing licence fees in action and come from Trusts that have funds to be spent only on additional services for freshwater anglers.

Our Club has the aim of giving back to the community by stocking local streams and dams with various fish, and by opening the world, and joy, of fishing to everyone – young, old, and everyone in between!

We love seeing the enjoyment that Tenth Dam gives the Guyra community and watching everyone utilise the dam. Our aim was to ensure that the fishing experience was opened to more individuals, therefore installing the pontoon was a natural next step to take.

The wheelchair accessible pontoon is the closest one of this scale for hundreds of kilometres.
