Garden festival expands to attract more visitors

The New England Garden Festival will return in 2024 following the success of the inaugural event held last year.

It will run for seven days from October 31st to November 6th and will expand to include a Spring Garden Trail to attract visitors to outlying towns.

The New England Garden Festival Inc. is a not-for-profit organisation hosting a feature event for the New England region to showcase the beautiful gardening potential plentiful in our area, whilst supporting Can Assist by raising funds for local patients, and their families, suffering from a cancer diagnosis.

The aim of the festival is to bring together gardeners, experts and the community for fun and educational activities, along with a great range of market stalls selling garden-related products. A number of inspirational gardens will be open, along with winning gardens in the Armidale Garden Competition.

This year's festival will kick off with a Spring Garden Trail, travelling across six country towns in the beautiful New England region in seven days, showcasing 18+cold climate gardens to visitors.

Three gardens in each town will

open, starting in Walcha on October 31st, and then heading to Uralla on November 1st, Armidale on November 2nd-3rd, Guyra November 4th, Glen Innes November 5th and concluding in Tenterfield on November 6th.

Visitors are encouraged to stay in each town the night before to make most use of the gardens' opening hours. When the gardens close, visitors are encouraged to visit the locally recommended 'hot spots' from each town before moving on to the next town. Specific garden details will be published closer to the event.

The main festival event will be once again held at the Armidale Racecourse on Saturday and Sunday November 2nd to 3rd. There has already been an incredible re-


sponse from stallholders, with the same number from last year already locked in and more applications to be a part of the festival still coming. As well as the stalls, there will also be workshops, including new additions to the schedule.

Last year television personality Brendan Moar took to the stage as the festivals' special guest and organisers promise an excellent special guest is once again in the works for this year.

The festival is still run entirely by a crew of very dedicated volunteers, with some additional help from the volunteer garden clubs in all the towns except Walcha, where the Quota club is taking the reins and assisting with organisation

The event will be raising funds for Can Assist branches in Armidale, Glen Innes, Guyra and Uralla. Tenterfield and Walcha will each name a charity in their town that they will donate to.

Reduced aviation fees at Armidale Airport take off

Aviation landing and airport parking fees at Armidale Regional Airport have been reduced to encourage general aviation users and visitors to the region.

"We are excited to announce that General Aviation landing fees and aircraft parking fees have been significantly reduced to encourage general aviation users and visitors to Armidale," said Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland.

"By reducing landing and aircraft parking fees, we're making our regional airport more attractive to aviation users, which will increase traffic and stimulate local economic growth.

"Lower fees will encourage more people flying into our region, bringing in tourists who hopefully stay longer in our beautiful city."

Light aircraft landing fees at Armidale Regional Airport have been reduced from \$17 to \$10 and light aircraft grass parking fees have been reduced from \$34 to \$10.

Angela Garvey, Manager at Armidale Regional Airport, said the fee reductions were "significant" considering Armidale Regional Airport was a security controlled airport.

"We want to promote the New England Region as a wonderful destination for a weekend or weeklong stay and reducing aviation landing and parking fees is a great way to encourage aviation users to fly into Armidale and stay here longer," said Ms Garvey.

Local government elections draw near

NSW Local Government elections will be held in NSW on Saturday, September 14th.

Armidale Regional Council voters will be asked to choose nine councillors, a reduction from the current eleven representatives.

A number of candidates have already begun the nomination process which will officially open on August 5th.

Current councillors Sam Coupland, Paul Gaddes, Debra O'brien and Todd Redwood look set to run again.

Others names listed on the NSW Electoral Commission website are Caroline Chapman, Sirisena Gamage, Madankumar Narayanmurthy, Robert Richardson and Lisa Ward.

If you are thinking about running in the election, while there are no special qualifications that

you need, there are a number of regulations you will need to be familiar with.

To be eligible to be nominated as a candidate for an election in a local government area, you also must be enrolled to vote in the local government area prior to nominating.

You can't nominate yourself to run for local government, you need to be nominated by either a registered political party, or two people who are registered to vote in the same LGA that you are running for.

Nominations open on Monday August 5th, and close at midday on the following Wednesday, August 14th.

You can create an account on the nomination system and start preparing your applications now on the NSW Electoral Commission website. The website also outlines crucial information on regulations that candidates need to follow around campaigning, spending, and electoral material.

If you have moved recently or are turning 18 before the election, now is the time to update your enrolment.

The NSW Electoral Commission is encouraging voters to check their enrolment before August 5th to make sure they are ready to vote. Voting is compulsory.

Acting NSW Electoral Commissioner Matt Phillips reminded voters that at council elections voters must attend a polling place in their council area or ward.

"If you've moved recently or aren't enrolled to vote where you currently live, update your details now so you can vote at a polling place near you."

"You cannot vote outside your local government area at local council elections, so it's important your details on the electoral roll are correct."

Mr Phillips said it is compulsory to enrol to vote in NSW elections if you are eligible and aged 18 or over.

"If you are 17 and will be 18 on or before election day this year, you can provisionally enrol now and be ready to vote in September."

"It's quick and easy to do online. Go to elections.nsw.gov.au to find out how to enrol."

All you need to enrol is a driver's licence or similar identification document or you can have someone who is already enrolled confirm your identity."

Launch events for Friends of New England Rail Trail

New England Vision 2030 (NEV 2030) will host the first of three 'Friends of New England Rail Trail' launch events on Wednesday July 31st at the Armidale Bowling Club starting at 5.30pm.

Further launch events will be held in Glen Innes on August 7th and Guyra on August 14th. The Guyra event will be held at the Guyra Bowling Club.

Following the success of their online petition which was launched earlier this year, NEV2030 suggested starting up a Friends Group to be a major community support group for the trail when it is up and running. The petition was signed by 6781 people over seven weeks.


They are hoping to build on this support within the community and have formed a steering committee which is inclusive with members from Armidale, Guyra and Glen Innes. Convenor Maria Hitchcock said they have had out-

standing support from the community with 54 financial members so far and they hope to sign up many more at their launch events.

Included in their team is a professional graphic designer who has created a logo, slogan and designs for merchandise as well as preparing an exciting presentation for the three launch events.

Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland will officially launch the Friends Group in Armidale and Guyra while Glen Innes Severn Mayor Rob Banham will do the honours in Glen Innes. The founder of New England Rail Trail, Dave Mills, will tell people the big story from how it was conceived to the present day.

Ms Hitchcock said it promises to be a terrific night and even if you are not a cyclist it would be worth coming along to get informed. It's a free event - no need to register, just turn up and bring a friend.

Wildlife Tails



Quolls and their devastating visits to poultry pens.

Caring for native animals can be a challenge for volunteers but also very rewarding when you encounter healthy animals. Northern Tablelands Wildlife Carers rescue and re-locate native animals which turn up in undesirable places.

A recent call to visit to a chook run was one such case. Quolls are a known local animal species and have a devastating reaction to pens of domestic laying hens and chickens. What sets them off on a killing spree to kill most and eat only one is unknown.

These local native quolls can climb like cats and gain entry to all but the most secure pens and attack they after dark.

Their usual diet is small mammals, birds and arthropods (insects) found on forest ground.

This image is of an adult male quoll which was recently caught and released



again well away from habitation. It is the biggest challenge rescuers face when trying to safely release a caught animal.

This quoll was captured in a fenced chook pen close to Armidale recently by NTWC.

It is not unknown for quolls to come in from the East and invade pens close to urban areas in search of food. NTWC recommends some strengthening up of chook pens and making sure the top is netted to avoid unwanted visitors.



Appeal for information into the 2009 disappearance of George Ross - Missing Persons Week

Police are re-appealing for public information as the search continues to locate a man who went missing from a property in the state's north more than 10 years ago.

George Ross – then aged 89 – was on his property with his wife on Pinkett Road, Lambs Valley, about 8km south-east of Glen Innes, when their car became stuck in a wash out, about 4.30pm on Sunday 26 April 2009.

George left his wife at the location to walk 4kms back to the house to retrieve another vehicle and come back for her, however; he never returned.

He was reported missing to police attached the New England Police District on Monday 27 April 2009, and an investigation commenced.

Checks revealed George went to the home and drove from the location in a gold Toyota Camry sedan.

Mr Ross was believed to be having memory loss issues before his disappearance.

About 8am on Friday 1 May 2009, the Camry was located on the side of the road on Paddys Land Road, Wards Mistake.

In March 2012, a coronial inquest found that it was likely that Mr Ross had died in the vicinity of the Guy Fawkes National Park in NSW, but the date, place and cause of death was undetermined.

NSW Police continue to investigate the circumstances surrounding Mr Ross's disappearance and New England Police District Crime Manager, Acting Insp Matt Harmer, is urging anyone with information to come forward.

"Police have conducted extensive inquiries with the aim to find out what happened to Mr Ross and are seeking closure for the family," A/Insp Harmer said.

"Any information, no matter how insignificant, could be the missing puzzle piece to solving the disappearance of Mr Ross. I urge you to pick up the phone and call Crime Stoppers if you know something,"



A/Insp Harmer said.

At the time of his disappearance, Mr Ross was described as being of Caucasian appearance, of a thin build, about 175cm tall, balding on top of his head with white hair. He also utilised a walking stick.

Missing Persons Week is an annual national campaign to show-case missing persons and unidentified bodies and human remains cases and raise awareness of the issues and impacts surrounding these incidents. Missing Persons Week runs between Sunday (28 July 2024), and Saturday 3 August

2024.

This year's 'Always Searching' campaign focuses on the dedication and continuing efforts of police to solve missing persons investigations.

If you have been reported as missing it means that someone is concerned about your safety and welfare. You should attend the nearest police station with identification so that police can ascertain that you are safe and well. It is not a crime to go missing and police will respect your privacy if you don't wish to disclose your location to your family.

There is support for carers through Carer Gateway. If you provide care and support to a family member or friend, with disability, mental illness, chronic condition, drug or alcohol dependency, terminal illness or who is frail due to age, you could be a carer.

Carers NSW is the peak nongovernment organisation for carers in NSW, and the dedicated Carer Gateway service provider in the Central Coast, Hunter New England and North Coast regions of NSW. This includes Guyra and surrounding regions.

Carer Gateway provides services in-person, online and over the phone, ensuring carers can access the support they need when they need it. Services include counselling, peer support, tailored support packages, emergency respite, coaching and more.

OUR HISTORY: GUYRA LAW AND ORDER

With the construction of the Northern Railway, a police station was established in South Guyra and a mounted constable was appointment in 1885.

Between 1887 and 1904 a number of rented premises were used for the purposes in both South Guyra and North Guyra. However, by 1904 the need had arisen for a more permanent station due to another constable being attached.

The works Department announced in November 1904 that a sum of 850 pounds has been placed on the estimates for the erection of police buildings in South Guyra. The Guyra Argus, 10 November 1904 stated: "this sum should be ample to replace the present primitive structure with up-to-date premises that will mean a great improvement to the appearance of Guyra".

In November 1905 a police lock-up and residence for a keeper were constructed at 187 Falconer Street, Guyra. The building consisted of four large residential rooms, hall, kitchen, bath, store, washroom, single officer's room, two cells, and

prisoner's yard.

Despite the new building, other premises were rented at North Guyra, Guyra Argus January 1907 reported: "Three years ago it was deemed advis-

able to station a police constable at North Guyra as the population then warranted such an officer residing in the locality. Since then owing, presumably, to the Department having a vacant house near the Courthouse, and to save the rental of the North Guyra police residence, the constable was shifted to the former place, thus leaving the north unprotected. The hoodlum element watches the officials' departure for the south and frequently, much too frequently, celebrate it by horseplay, fighting and other rowdy

displays"

"On a previous occasion efforts were made with this object, but for some reason satisfactory to themselves the authorities would not favorably entertain the proposal. The necessity for such a building has been manifest on many occasions, and during the Show week seven or eight persons for immoderately worshipping at the shrine of Bacchus had to be taken to the police Station,

which is about a mile distant. What this means to the police officers needs no elaborate expatiation, but to say the least of it, is a gross injustice to them. We have heard several visitors remark that it was an extraordinary thing that a second building was not provided, and opined that some of the public bodies should take the matter up with determination and vigor."

By 1930, the Progress Association of the day pressed for a central position near the School in North Guyra. In May 1932 a building at 173 Bradley Street, was leased. This then became the permanent police station and residence for the officer-in charge.

The building also incorporated a general police officer, a sergeant's office, a strong room, and a portable cell. The building was purchased in 1944 for 700 pounds and it remained the site of the Guyra Police station until 1979 when a new police station was built. The old police station in Bradley Street became the exclusive residence for the officer-in -charge.

July 26th - In what was the final selling week before the mid-year recess the market managed its best performance in six weeks.

Whilst some of this rise can probably be attributed to exporters firming up some quantity because of the recess most of the rise appears to be currency driven.

The 17 cent increase in the Eastern Market Indicator when looked at in US dollars actually translated to a 4 cent decline. In the Northern region a 3 cent rise on the first day of sales was followed by a 14 cent jump on the final day.

The finer the micron the stronger the support was this

week with a few individual micron indicators failing to follow the bulk of the market higher. 29,784 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed rate of 6.8%.

included Maior buvers Tianyu, ΡJ Morris and Endeavour Wool. Combined buyers the top three purchased close to 50% of the national Merino fleece offering.

No forecast has been made available yet regarding quantity on offer when sales resume after the recess.

Historically there is potential for a 50,000 bale offering however the change in recess dates may avoid this.

This report will resume on the 23rd of August.
