The Energy Corporation of NSW (EnergyCo) is delivering the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ) to provide a clean, affordable and reliable power supply for energy consumers across NSW.

Network infrastructure project update

EnergyCo is progressing plans for new transmission infrastructure to connect the New England REZ with the existing electricity network in the Hunter. We recently lodged a scoping report with the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure and it is now available on the NSW Major Projects Planning Portal. The scoping report provides a detailed overview of the project and potential impacts that will require further consideration under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979. 

After throwing around lots of different ideas, the 'Harvest Collective' was born. They tested the waters with their clientele, receiving a lot of valuable input about what they wanted to see in Guyra.

Their main objective was to do something that would create interest in the town and fulfill the needs of the community. At the same time they were conscious of keeping prices reasonable and quality high.

Initially they have tried to source quality Australian brands and prod-

The 'Harvest Collective' will feature both new and pre loved clothing, as well as gifts, for all ages. They are also taking goods on consignment and welcome creatives who are looking for an outlet for their products.

Ultimately they envisage it being a space that meets the needs of the community and becomes a point of interest for visitors to town.

New name request for Guyra Park

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is seeking feedback following a request to officially name the recreation area at the Southern end of Bradley Street Guyra Memorial Park.

ARC has received a letter from the Combined Guyra Clubs and Organisations to request the new name which is required to go on public exhibition for 28 days from August 7th.

"Guyra Garden Club has approached former members of the locally now defunct Apex Club who have agreed for this area of the park to be known as Guyra Memorial Park," the letter said.

Signatures of committee members of the various clubs, including former members of the Apex club, were included in the letter to support the naming request. The area to the north of the picnic shed will continue to be known as 'Apex Park'

The park features a number of completed war memorial projects



including

Memorial Avenue, the Mandala Garden and Memorial Plinths. The Guyra Garden Club was successful in obtaining three grants totalling \$70,000 for their construction.

These works have taken over three years to complete – thanks to a host of local volunteers, many coming from the local garden club.

These projects have been successfully delivered along with collaborative efforts by Armidale Regional Council, Guyra Country Women's Association (CWA) and Guyra Rotary Club to deliver a new sheltered BBQ, picnic table area and Rotunda in the park.

ARC Mayor Sam Coupland said it is fitting that this park is being named the Guyra Memorial Park as it features a number of memorial aspects including Memorial Plinths identifying service people lost overseas during World Wars 1 and 2.

"By naming this park, we can celebrate our community's identity, commemorate those who fought and died for our country and also create a welcoming space that Guyra residents can enjoy."

One of the organisers of the project David Kanaley said the group plans to apply for more funding to include a footpath that links the rotunda to the memorial avenue of trees and the memorial plinths.

Rail Trail Friends launch in Guyra

New England Visions 2030 (NEV 2030) will host the final Friends of New England Rail Trail launch event on Wednesday August 14th at the Guyra Bowling Club starting at 5.30pm.

There was good attendance at the two previous events with an estimated crowd of 125 at Armidale and 35 at Glen Innes.

The friends group was formed following the success of an online petition which was launched earlier this year. Their aim is to be a major community support group for the trail when it is up and running.

The steering committee includes members from Armidale, Guyra and Glen Innes. Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland will officially launch the Friends Group in Guyra.

The New England Rail Trail (NERT) was initiated in Guyra and was originally planned for

Black Mountain to Ben Lomond. Glen Innes Severn Council saw the opportunity to expand the trail to Glen Innes Station and started their own planning.

Following the amalgamation between Armidale Dumaresq Council and Guyra Shire Council, the newly formed Armidale Regional Council inherited the project and passed a resolution to expand the trail to Armidale.

The first stages are currently being planned to start from Glen Innes to Glencoe and Armidale to Dumaresq respectively.

Former Guyra Mayor Hans Hietbrink will officiate at the Guyra event and Guyra local Dave Mills, will tell people the big story from how it was conceived to the present day.

Water budgeting: calculate your stock water requirements

Developing on-farm water management strategies for the benefit of livestock health and natural capital is the goal of the final in a series of stock water events hosted by GLENRAC, near Glen Innes.

GLENRAC CEO Kylie Falconer said by taking the time to better quantify future water needs, farmers could enhance their long-term farm water security, contribute to improved livestock health and natural capital values and their overall resilience to dry conditions.

"We have financial budgets and pasture budgets, and at this workshop on August 27 we'll learn how to develop a water budget for our farms," Ms Falconer said.

"This workshop will address

the need for information and support for water systems planning for New England farms that has been identified as a result of feedback from previous field days."

This is the final event in the Best Practice water infrastructure for New England Farms project supported by the Armidale Node of the SQNNSW Innovation Hub. To date the project has delivered four field day events attended by 133 participants, incorporating five onfarm projects that showcase innovative water infrastructure solutions to meet farm water needs.

"This will be the first time this water budgeting workshop has been offered in Northern NSW for farmers: it will have a practical focus to help farmers calculate their current and future stock and domestic water needs, as well as improve their capacity to meet these needs through water storage, using dams, underground water or streams," Ms Falconer said.

During the workshop, farmers will work through a Farm Water Management Plan (FWMP) template that can be then used to develop a farm-specific plan.

"This will be a valuable planning document for future discussions within your own business, with your bank manager or that could be used to support drought preparedness loan applications to Regional Investment Corporation or NSW Rural Assistance Authority," Ms Falconer said.

"We expect that by taking the time to better quantify future water needs, farmers will enhance their long-term farm water security, contribute to improved livestock health and natural capital values and their overall resilience to dry conditions."

Expert speakers on the day include Sapphire Irrigation Consulting's Peter Smith, Murray Local Land Services' Paul Simpson, and other industry experts.
