

The senior girls were able to try on the elegant gowns and select their favourites to take home, all free of charge. The event was a tremendous success and was enjoyed by all who attended.


'The Wardrobe Project' will

# Last stop for e-scooter trial

If you are yet to hop on a purple e-scooter now is your last chance with the popular Armidale Escooter Trial ending on September 6th.

Armidale Regional Council partnered with Transport for NSW and Beam Mobility to deliver the trial which commenced last year in September. The trial allowed e-scooters hired through Beam Mobility to be ridden across areas of Armidale. 30,000 kilometres were travelled and over 45,000 trips taken to date across the Armidale area.

Whilst the trial is now coming to its natural conclusion the community has assisted the NSW Government to be better informed about the future of e-scooters in NSW.

Armidale Regional Council Gen-

eral Manager James Roncon said the e-scooter trial was one of many Council initiatives to be delivered through Council's Brilliant Region's Strategy to build a platform of digital capabilities.

"Technology is evolving fast and providing innovative opportunities to be better connected across council and within our community. Council is embarking on somewhat of a digital revolution having recently completed a trial of smart water meters and the roll-out of smart bins.

The e-scooter trial was a great opportunity for a regional community like Armidale to get a taste of new technology often only afforded to our city counterparts." Beam's General Manager (ANZ) Tom Cooper said the team at Beam Mobility we're proud to have brought zero-emissions transportation to Armidale.

"We would like to thank the Armidale Regional Council for their support of shared micromobility, being one of the first New South Wales councils to welcome shared e-scooters 12 months ago."

During the next three weeks Council is encouraging the community to take advantage of the purple e-scooters while they are available. Council will continue to assist Transport for NSW to learn more about new technologies and who knows maybe host another trial in the future.





#### Rural Market Reports

#### **Guyra Sheep** and Lamb Sale

Guyra Sales are still being held fortnightly. There is currently no market report available for these sales. On August 15th the yarding was 3490 head comprising (XBL 1480, Store 1033, ML 60, Sheep 917) Expected yarding for August 27th - Total 4146 (XBL 1435 Store 1163 ML 610 Hoggets 23 Sheep 915)

#### **Armidale Cattle Sale**

August 15th - This week saw a reduction in numbers due to the wet conditions. It was a very mixed quality yarding with market trends firm to dearer across almost all categories.

A total of 495 head yarded, Averaging \$1242.15 per head and 302.97 c/kg.

With a bumper Spring almost guaranteed there was a reduction in numbers. It was a very mixed

quality penning that featured a few high quality feeder steers and very good heavyweight cows. There was a reduced gallery of buyers with a couple of the larger processors not participating. There were varying trends through the young cattle with the lightweight yearling steers mostly dearer under strong restocker competition. Quality was a factor in the dearer prices for the heavyweight yearling feeder steers with the overall trend also showing improvement. Reduced competition on yearling heifers saw all but a few selected pens sell to cheaper trends. Well heifers finished grown experienced little change while there was some local restocker competition on the plainer conditioned lots. There were a lot less cows in the market with this factor contributing to an improvement in average quality. Market trends firm to dearer

however the high price cows were not quite as good as the sale toppers from the previous There was competition on the better heavyweight bulls with the market showing some improvement.

#### **Weekly Wool Sales**

August 23rd - Sales resumed after the annual three week recess and on paper it appears the additional two sales before heading to this year's recess has helped with the flow of wool onto the market.

Traditionally this first sale back is a 50,000 bale plus national offering but just 42,400 bales were presented to the trade. The Northern region indicator lost 6 cents on the opening day of sales followed by a further 10 cents on

The largest falls were confined to the 18 micron and finer types

with the 21 micron indicator also coming under pressure. The 11 cent loss in the headline Eastern market indicator for the week translated into a 9 cent rise when looked at in US dollars.

The Aussie dollar was almost 1.5 cents dearer against the US dollar compared to the pre recess close. 38,578 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed rate of 9.1%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Endeavour Wool and Sequoia. Bales offered for the season to date are almost 21% below the corresponding period last year and will fall further behind based on forecast offerings over the next fortnight.

The Australian Wool Production Forecasting Committee announced last week that the National woolclip is expected to be 10.1% below the 2023/24 level.

# **Knitting with Resilience Workshop**

Southern New England Landcare hosted the sold-out Knitting with Resilience workshop in Walcha on August 10th, where 26 attendees from Gunnedah to Coffs Harbour crafted their own Merino wool throws.

The workshop, delivered by the inspiring Sam Longmore from Ohh Bulldust, focused on resilience, community, and creating supportive networks.

After being paralysed on one side following a car accident in 2013, Sam devised a method of knitting that allowed her to knit using only one hand.

During the workshop, Sam guided participants in making their own Merino wool throw and shared her personal journey of resilience, offering insights and encouragement for their own struggles.

'Sam conveyed sensitivity and support for all participants, she gave



generously with her time and created a positive learning culture,' said Elizabeth Rosser, Landcare Coordinator with Southern New England Landcare.

'We wanted this workshop to be a place where people took some time for themselves, nurtured their creativity, and connected with others

'It was about more than knitting; it was about building a supportive community and sharing resilience.'

The workshops were designed to help attendees cultivate patience, creativity, and a sense of accomplishment.

Knitting with Resilience was the

first in a series of workshops funded by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) Community Connection for Outlying Areas grant.

Louise and Sarah designed the yarns to be striking and different. There are two yarn bases and six individually designed colours in each base.



shirts, shawls etc.

The Cheviot on Finn, is 33% Grey Cheviot and 66% White Finn. This combination has produced a very squishy yarn with a silver tone which has dyed up to have a shadowing effect on the colours. This is a true DK and is perfect for garments, scarves etc.

Each of these yarns are currently available in garment quantities but are limited, as each colour way is in hand dyed lots. There are also some natural skeins available in each base.
