Election delivers a mix of old and new

Two Guyra candidates are still in the hunt to secure a spot on Armidale Regional Council following the Local Government Elections which were held on September 14th.

It will be two weeks before the final results are known, however both Eli Imad and Jane Mactier are well placed to secure one of the nine spots on council for the upcoming term.

The Group D ticket, led by current mayor Sam Coupland, has emerged as the front runners following the initial first preference count. With close to fifty percent of the overall vote they look to have already secured enough votes to get four members of their team elected.

This would mean that Sam, Todd Redwood and Paul Gaddes will serve a second term on council and newcomer Kay Endres will also claim a spot.

By midday Tuesday just over 15,000 votes had been counted with current trends indicating that both Labor's Susan McMichael and the Greens' Dorothy Robinson are also in a position to be re-elected.

As the fifth member of the Group D ticket Guyra's Jane Mactier, is hoping that further counting will go her way.

"While things are looking positive for me in the election, I'm not guaranteed a spot on the council just yet," Jane said.

"Throughout this journey, I've built valuable connections within the community and with incoming councillors, which puts me in a strong position to ensure everyone has a voice.

"I've had the privilege of receiving help from previous Guyra councillors, mayors, local stalwarts, and those newer to town who trust me to be a voice for our community. Your trust and support mean the world to me."

Leading Group C candidate Eli Imad thinks he is 'pretty much assured' of a seat at this stage.

Eli believes his team ran a good grassroots campaign in Guyra which has paid off.

"We had major opposition particularly from the mayor's team which included another Guyra local," Eli said.

"We ran a strong campaign which laid the ground work for success and I think we rattled the opposition who haven't seen a good campaign before."

Eli said that during the campaign he made a lot friendships across the board which he hopes to build on if elected. If he gets in the main matter for urgency in the water quality in Guyra.

Both the Guyra based candidates think it would be good for Guyra to have two representatives. Eli said 'it will be good to have two people representing the town' and promised to 'work together to deliver what is best for Guyra'.

Jane believes that the 'possibility of two voices speaking up for Guyra is better representation than expected, and it should help pave the way forward for our community.'

Other candidates still in the running for the final spots on council are current councillor Brad Widders and newcomer Jenny Wild who will be looking for second preferences to get them over the line. Group E, led by Rob Taber is also a chance.

Missing out this time around will be Margaret O'Connor after her Group F ticket failed to attract the needed votes.

Landholders and residents ask 'Is the New England REZ Broken?'

New England landowners and residents will ask the question 'Is the New England REZ broken?' at a forum to be hosted by Responsible Energy Development for New England in Armidale on October 3rd.

The forum will be held at the Armidale Bowling Club and will bring together community members including those impacted by 13 renewables projects.

It will present the first interactive cumulative impact map of proposed New England renewable energy projects and transmission lines, from Nundle to Glen Innes, created by environmentalist Steven Nowakowski.

Speakers will discuss five themes; planning policy failure, poor site selection, environmental impacts, rising renewables and energy costs, and nuclear energy. They include ReD4NE member Beth White; landowner and conservationist Dr Roger Welch; Centre for Independent Studies Energy Director Aiden Morrison; Nuclear for Climate Australia founder Robert Parker; University of New England lecturer Dr Steven Debus'; Kindly Animal Shelter owner Trinity Hooper and Hills of Gold Preservation Inc. member Megan Trousdale. ReD4NE spokesperson Beth

White says the forum is motivated by landowner frustration at the disconnect between federal government messaging on social licence, community consultation, the lived experience with the NSW Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure, (DPHI) Independent Planning Commission, (IPC) and EnergyCo.

Mrs White pointed to the recent EnergyCo New England transmission route proposal and the DPHI and IPC approvals of Thunderbolts Wind Farm and Hills of Gold Wind Farm as examples of local majority opposition, environmental concerns, and Government's own guidelines being ignored.

"With capital expenditure and operating costs increasing, Renewable Energy projects are increasingly, unviable economically. Federal and state forecasts that renewable energy will put downward pressure on energy prices is an illusion. The outcome is quite the opposite. Families are paying more," Mrs White said.

"The New England is watching the cumulative impact in the Central West Orana REZ to see what is coming, but there is no mechanism for landowners to stop any imposition on quality of life, on community cohesion, or property rights."

Young shearer headed to New Zealand

Guyra shearer Jack Lockyer is heading to New Zealand to learn how to encourage more young shearers to join the industry.

Jack and his employer, GA & A Mayled Shearing Contractor's are participating in the Global Footprints Employer Supported Stream, a new pilot program that works in partnership between the scholar, their employer and Global Footprints.

Jack has already made his mark on the industry during his short career. He took up a school based shearing traineeship in 2022 and then progressed to a full-time traineeship at the end of year 10.

After just five months of fulltime shearing he won the NSW State Sports Shear Intermediate title at Dubbo in May 2023.

This enabled him to travel to Jamestown SA in October 2023 with the state team to compete at the National Shearing titles where he was placed 5th.

Winning the scholarship will

help Jack to broaden his knowledge of the shearing industry and gain an insight into how shearing contracting is run in different areas of the world.

Jack plans to travel to New Zealand where they have vibrant shearing and sheep industry and learn first-hand how to encourage other young people to join the industry.

In his scholarship application he identified this as an extremely important factor in the long term sustainability of the industry both in Australia and overseas.

"Just in our small area we have three contracting teams with only three shearers under 30 years of age and two shed staff under 35 years," Jack said.

"It would be interesting to find out what systems they have in place in New Zealand to encourage young people to the shearing industry and if I could apply it, not only to our local area but around the district and the Sports Shear circuit.

"By building a network of contacts, I also hope to gain valuable workable knowledge into how you manage different personalities in various workplaces and encourage a new generation to take up work in shearing and wool handling."

'Give a Sheet' for the planet

Does your linen closet need a good spring clean? Armidale Regional Council (ARC) will be holding a 'Give a Sheet' linen recycling day at the Armidale Waste Transfer Station on Saturday, September 21st.

ARC is partnering with BlockTexx - a company that specialises in textile recovery technologies - so residents can recycle their unwanted linen.

Every year in Australia, almost one million tonnes of textile waste ends up in landfill and global textile waste is predicted to hit 140 million tonnes by 2030.

While some people take their unwanted linen to charity and

opportunity shops, some are reluctant to accept all linen and textile products from the public.

"We're inviting you to clean out your 'robe to clean up the globe'," said a spokesperson from BlockTexx.

"We are collaborating with Councils around the nation via a series of innovative linen collections addressing our growing textile waste problem.

"We'll take your old towels and pillowcases too!"

BlockTexx said people who want to participate in the 'Give a Sheet' linen collection day should:

• Collect your old, worn-out sheets, towels, pillowcases,

quilt covers and linen that you can no longer use. (Please keep your surplus shoes at home as they can't accept these)

- Make sure all your linen items are clean
- Bring your linen to the Armidale Waste Transfer Station between 9am and 3pm on Saturday 21 September.

All linen donations will be collected by BlockTexx to be converted into valuable, high-grade materials that can be used by Australian manufacturers to create new products such as hydromulch, fertiliser, shopping baskets and geosynthetic fabrics.

Fiori Musicali to perform 'Misa a Buenos Aires' in Guyra

MisaTango or Misa a Buenos Aires ("Mass in Buenos Aires") gained much notoriety when it was performed in Rome in October 2013, in the Church of St. Ignatius of Loyola, during the International Festival of Music and Sacred Art in the Vatican.

The MisaTango was chosen that year to pay homage to the enthronement of the former cardinal of Buenos Aires who became Pope Francis in 2013, in reference to the Argentine origins of this former Tango dancer.

Created 20 years ago by the Argentinian composer Martín Palmeri, MisaTango is a choral mass on Tango sounds. It is composed on the same movements as a mass in classical Latin, in which the harmonics and syncopated rhythms of tango are mixed.

Fiori Musicali's performance will include Leanne Roobol as soloist, and an ensemble featuring James Chen, India Smith, Alma Kanety, Stephen Tafra, Arlene Fletcher and Robyn Bradley. The conductor is Stuart Pavel.

There will be two performances: Australian Poetry Hall of Fame, Guyra on Saturday 21st September at 3pm; and the TAS Hoskins Centre, Armidale on Sunday 22nd September at 7:30pm

Community encouraged to revisit Armidale Region's Community Plan

Is Armidale Regional Council (ARC) on track to deliver the vision of the 'Advancing Our Region' Community Plan?

The Community Plan was developed and endorsed by Council after extensive consultation in 2021/2022, and with the election of a new council, the community is encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity to revisit its community plan

ARC's acting General Manager Annie Harris said that the Community Plan represents the community's aspirations for the region and sets the tone for Council's 'Delivery Program' and 'Operational Plan'.

"The Community Plan is just that – the community's plan. It is not a document owned by Council.

Instead, it guides Council," Ms Harris said

"The 'Advancing Our Region' Community Plan mapped out a plan for 10 years," Ms Harris said. "Now, three years in, it is timely for the community to check in with the plan including what has been achieved so far."

"These achievements include an organisational restructure focussed on delivering what the community asked for - such as water security, planned land use, and a housing strategy.

"While ensuring sustainable community services, Council staff have also been activating open spaces, and prioritising jobs and growth."

The opportunity to review the 'Advancing Our Region' Community Plan will remain open until November 4th – exceeding Council's usual 28-day public exhibition period to ensure maximum opportunity for the community to provide feed-

Armidale Region's new Council will be inducted in early October. They will be invited to participate in community consultation, including pop-up stalls around the region during October. This is an opportunity for new councillors to meet with people and gather community thoughts that will

be collated alongside 'Your Say' feedback.

The Community Plan will then be placed on Public Exhibition in December. Council endorsement of the revised plan is expected to be sought in February 2025.

Informed by the endorsed Community Plan, the next 'Delivery Program' and 'Operational Plan & Budget' will then be prepared for Council, seeking endorsement for Public Ex-

NSW, which is why many, particularly in our border communities, relocate for a salary boost.

Without appropriate remuneration, this is simply not going to happen.

Everyone values our nurses and that is why I am standing behind their push for fairer and more appropriate salaries, so that we can attract them and keep them.

In my first few months as an MP, it has become apparent that all the problems with healthcare in regional NSW come back to chronic staffing shortages.

Whether it be our police, our firefighters, our nurses, or doctors, it is evident we have a very clear issue with staffing shortages right across the Northern

We need to make our region attractive for highly trained and highly skilled individuals.

For our nurses, one such way is to boost their pay to ensure they receive fair and appropriate salaries, in line with other states and territories.

Bloat and pulpy kidney are 'spring killers'

Lush green feed is currently present in paddocks across the Northern Tablelands and North West thanks to recent rainfall, changing however these seasonal conditions are also creating the perfect conditions for common springtime animal health issues.

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services is reminding producers to watch for bloat and pulpy kidney as pastures respond to recent rain events and warm soil temperatures, creating a sudden change in diet for

Pulpy kidney is often the result of a sudden change of feed, which is a disease in cattle, sheep and goats caused by the overgrowth of clostridial organisms or bacteria in the gut due to the consumption of high carbohydrate feed. Animals being supplemented with heavy grain feeding or moving onto fresh green pasture are at high risk of the disease, which often manifests in young, fast growing livestock that are unweaned or recently weaned and are without a full vaccination history. Pulpy kidney is fast acting and there

are often no prior signs of sickness in livestock.

Andrew Biddle, District Veterinarian, recommends a vaccination program of two doses of 5-in-l, dosed 4-6 weeks apart. Further 5 in 1 boosters will be required to maintain a level of protection when feed is so lush and clover dominated.

These conditions also increase the risk of pregnancy toxaemia, hypocalcaemia (milk fever) and grass tetany. This can be managed by providing hay to balance the highly digestible pasture and a mineral supplement containing calcium and magnesium mixed with salt to make it palatable.

While 'green pick' is a great sign of pasture growth and a reduced reliance supplementary feed, new green growth also has a water content of up to 90%, making it impossible for animals to eat enough to satisfy their nutritional needs if they do not also have access to other types of feed.


"Producers should continue to provide supplementary feed for livestock until pastures mature and the water content drops", said Dr Biddle.

Bloat is another risk to livestock grazing lush pasture, especially if the pasture has a high legume content (clover, medics or lucerne). Bloat is caused by a sudden intake of lush, green feed which results in the production of large amounts gas in the rumen, compressing lungs and stopping blood flow, which can lead to death

Signs of bloat include an obvious swelling of the upper left flank, rapid breathing, and a reluctance to move or graze. In severe cases where the animal is lying down and unable to rise, veterinary advice should be obtained immediately.

The risk of bloat can be minimised by using bloat oil on trough water and using bloat blocks on in paddocks with dam/creek water, ensuring livestock have access roughage such as hay, grazing in smaller paddocks allows more intensive monitoring management and using grazing pasture management to avoid grazing high-risk pastures.

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

September 10th - Yarding of 4220 comprised of 1253 XB Lambs, 526 Sttore Lambs, 308 Merino Lambs, 13 Hoggets, 2097 Sheep and 23 Rams.

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 12th - A total of 853 head yarded, Averaging \$1158.55 per head and 324.93 c/kg. Numbers were down 130 on the previous sale.

The reduction in supply is not uncommon at this time of the year. A very mixed quality penning was presented to a reduced field of buyers.

Young cattle were well supplied as were cows while there were limited numbers of export cattle. Very good overnight rain provided a boost in the young cattle market with restockers almost guaranteed an outstanding season.

There significant was improvement in the light and medium weight yearling steers. The better quality light weight yearling heifers sold on a mostly firm market trend. There was an odd slightly dearer sale while the plainer quality lots lost a little ground.

The medium and heavy weights saw attracted less competition to sell to a slightly cheaper trend. The small numbers of heavy grown steers suitable to process sold to a cheaper trend with the well finished grown heifers following a similar trend.

There was a reduction in the

cow market in line with what has happened at other recent markets with all but a few restocker cows much cheaper than the sale of a fortnight ago. A large offering of bulls sold to a slightly cheaper trend.

Weekly Wool Market

September 13th - Less than 30,000 bales were offered nationally this week with the market managing to register some increases in most of the Merino types.

The Northen region indicator closed 6 cents higher on Tuesday and gained another 4 cents on Wednesday. The 20 micron and finer Merino fleece types finished around 1.5% higher with the Merino carding indicator the only area of the market continuing to show weakness. In

US dollars the headline market indicators remained unchanged as the Aussie dollar drifted lower against the US.

28,336 bales were sold nationally for the week with passed in rates remaining low at 5.5%. Major buyers included Tianyu (dominating with 21.3% of the Merino fleece offering), Endeavour Wool and Techwool. The small increases over the past fortnight has returned the overall market back to its average price point over the past 8 selling weeks.

Forecast weekly auction offerings look set to remain in the low 30,000s and with 74,000 fewer bales offered for the season to date it is becoming interesting to see if demand outstrips supply sometime soon.


Records broken - warmest August night on record

Guyra, along with other regions in New South Wales, experienced unseasonably warm conditions in the second half of August with temperatures reaching 18.0C or higher on nine days with the highest of 22.0C on the 30th being the warmest for August for 15 years.

The unusually warm end to winter was caused by a number of low pressure troughs and fast moving fronts bringing warm air into New South Wales from central Australia.

Guyra's average minimum of 4.8C for Auguust was the highest on record from 91 years of records. Also recorded was the highest minimum temperature (warmest night) of 14.1C on the 31st. This was the highest on record from 50 years of records. The previous highest 12.6C on 25th August 2009.

Other significant statistics from August were an average



maximum temperature of 15.5C which was the highest since 2009 when it was 16.2C and the highest maximum temperature of 22.0C on the 30th which was the highest since 24th August 2009 when it was 25.2C
