Lights on at Black Mountain

The historic Black Mountain Baptist Tabernacle came alive with festive spirit on Saturday, December 7th. For the first time in over four years, the cherished landmark held a service attracting upwards of 70 community members to the Christmas celebration, including Councillor Eli Imad.

The family-friendly event was promoted by Railene Turner, who funded the lighting of the church. Railene wanted to light up the little church to bring a bit of joy to people as they drive by and hopefully remind people of the reason for the season.

Attendees enjoyed a tasty BBQ picnic hosted by the Armidale District Baptist Church and a Christmas-themed service led by Associate Pastor Peter Holford

Former local Clive Stannard, whose father was a lay preacher at the Church during the 1930s, gave a blessing for the community.

The lighting project was approved by the Armidale District Baptist Church Committee and supported by its Secretary,

Robert Dewhurst.

During the evening's service, Pastor Holford invited the community to express interest in monthly summer services at the church. There is hope that regular gatherings will resume in this historic space, which has been an important home of faith and community in the region since its opening on April 27th, 1902.

The church's history is deeply rooted in the Black Mountain community. Early Baptist families built the structure by hand using bricks made of local clay quarried on Sharon Collin's property, 'Rose Valley.'

There is a brief outline detailing the origin of the Tabernacle on a plaque in front of the building.

Now, with its festive lights shining brightly, the Black Mountain Baptist Tabernacle is bringing the community together once again. It's a celebration of the true meaning of Christmas and is also a call to action, a reminder to reconnect with the values and traditions that make this time of year so special.

were on hand to officially open the festivities and light up the Christmas Tree.


"This family-friendly event has always been a highlight on the Guyra calendar and this year's event was a huge success," said ARC Mayor Sam Coupland.



No progression on Rail Trail

As of November 2024, the Armidale Regional Council (ARC) had not yet entered into any agreement with Transport for NSW / NSW State Government. The "Rail Trail" project had not progressed beyond the submission of a business case.

Throughout 2024 NSW Minister the Hon. Jenny Aitchison, had noted ARC had not made any attempt to comply with the NSW government's rail trail framework, which would have to be submitted and deemed satisfactory before any lease for a rail trail was granted by the NSW government.

S&GGRI has processed a letter to The Hon. Catherine King Federal Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government regarding the c. \$21m Grant Application informing of the lack of transparency and community consultation.

Please note the ARC made a commitment via a motion approved by Council, that this project would not impost the ratepayer or ARC in anyway.

We are disappointed that the mayor is continuing the narrative of exaggerating the economic benefits that a "Rail Trail" will bring to the area.

Let's be clear, the Emergency Authority withdrew the funding due to it receiving a "number of project variation requests from the council(s) ... The authority could not be satisfied the project represented value for money because of the substantial difference between the original project and the revised proposal." This initial funding withdrawal clearly demonstrates ARC's lack of understanding of the project, scope, works, budgets etc and derails the project.

Further, we are disgusted by the continued smoke and mirrors. Many rate-payers are questioning 'when would the withdrawal of funding have been made public by ARC?' Remember, this news broke because of the GISC tabling this on its November Council meeting Agenda.



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

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb

December 3rd - Yarding of approx. 6000 comprising 3500 sheep 2500 lambs. Not too many old season lambs were on offer with the best making to \$150

Across the board lambs were dearer. New season lambs ranging from 40 to 45 kg made around \$200. Lighter weight suckers made between \$100 and \$130

Mutton was also dearer. The best crossbred made \$130, with the majority of light to medium crossbred ewes making \$65 to \$95. Merino wethers made to \$110. Merino ewes made \$60 to \$85 depending on skin weight.

Armidale Cattle Sale

December 5th - Yarding 1250, down 50 on the previous sale. There was a very small reduction

in supply with this being the second last sale before the Christmas break. A sale to be held on the 12th.

Young cattle and cows made up the bulk of the offering along with a fair supply of grown heifers and bulls. The quality of the offering was very mixed. There was reduced export processor attendance however restocker and feedlot activity increased.

Strong restocker demand in the face of an excellent season saw the light weight steers sell to a dearer trend. The medium and heavy weight yearling steers also reaped the benefit of increased competition to sell to a dearer trend of 4c to 10c/kg. Heavy weights destined for the shorter fed programs were keenly sought.

Market trends for the light and medium weight yearling heifers were firm to slightly cheaper with the better quality lots least affected. Well finished heavy grown heifers to processors sold to cheaper trends with reduced competition. The better quality feeder heifers were slightly dearer while the secondary heifers were cheaper.

A strong cow market saw trends firm to slightly dearer. An improvement in quality accounted for an odd dearer sale on heavy bulls, the market generally firm despite the absence of one processor.

Weekly Wool Market

December 6th - The calmness in the market prevailed again this week with the Northern region indicator gaining one cent. The weekly closing quote over the last 4 selling weeks has also only moved by one cent.

A four week period of little volatility rarely occurs but it does indicate that supply and demand are currently well balanced.

The 17.5 and 18 micron indicators were the only individual categories to record a double digit movement coming off the back of a designated Superfine sale last week where they had gained ground.

33,368 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing higher to 8.9%. The major buyers continued a similar pattern seen over the past month with the top four once again purchasing over 50% of the national Merino fleece offering. Just two selling weeks remain before the mid-season recess.

Almost 40,000 bales are expected to be on offer next week and 36,000 in the following week. These figures are well below the corresponding period last season. 156,000 fewer bales have been offered nationally for the season to date.
