# Festival time is here

The Lamb and Potato Festival kicks of today and organisers are ready to feed and entertain the hordes of visitors who make Guyra a stop on their way to and from the Tamworth Country Music Festival.

They are also prepared to welcome busloads of visitors who make Guyra a destination in January to spend some time in the cool and enjoy food and entertainment under the elm trees in Rotary Park.

Visitors (and locals) are expected to eat their way through 240 legs of lamb, many hundreds of lamb burgers and other tasty lamb treats on offer in the Gazebo.

Add to that around 4000 lamb pies supplied by the Guyra Bakery, you can rest assured that nobody will leave the festival site hungry.

Missing from this year's festival will be the popular train rides and the model train display which are taking a break.

There will still be plenty to see and do. There is a full roster of entertainment to listen to while you enjoy your meals and plenty of stalls to browse. Many of the stalls are regulars however there will be a couple of new additions this year so they will be well worth checking out.

A new feature this year will be lamb sculptures which have been created by local community groups, so expect to see some great examples of local creativity scattered around.

The committee has also recognised the need to provide more food options and there will be a food vendor on site offering vegetarian and gluten free options to complement the existing menu.

The festival relies on volunteers and while they have lost some groups who have done regulars shifts in the food gazebo, they were grateful to see some new groups stepping in to fill the void.

In conjunction with the main festival you will be able to enjoy a range of activities happening around town. The CWA Art Exhibition is being held at GALA and the Guyra craft group will be selling their wares at the Anglican Church Hall for the duration of the festival.

The Burgess Garage car museum in Bradley St will be open daily, while the Guyra Museum will be open on both weekends. Special activities are planned for the final weekend with the popular Show and Shine in Bradley St, and the Antique Machinery Rally and Swap meet on the highway.

Profits from the festival are distributed to community groups each year, providing a welcome source of funds for the groups.

The festival committee say that they do it for the town and they also encourage locals to head on up for a meal or two and enjoy some of the fantastic music while they eat.

The festival runs from January 15th to January 26th and is open daily from 7.30am to 7.30pm.

## **DO YOU KNOW THE NEW BUSH FIRE DANGER LEVELS?**

Bush fire severity ratings have recently changed, after 50 years of the previous system, with the new warnings focused on four separate categories under the nation-wide Australian Fire Danger Rating System.

#### **GREEN – MODERATE**

Plan and prepare Stay up to date and be ready to act if there is a fire. **YELLOW – HIGH** Be ready to act

There's a heightened risk. Be alert for fires in your area. Decide what you will do if a fire starts. Your life and property may be at risk if a fire starts – the safest option is to avoid bush fire risk areas.

#### ORANGE – EXTREME

Take action now to protect your life and property These are dangerous fire conditions. Check your bush fire plan and ensure that your property is fire ready. If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, go to a safer location well before the fire impacts. Reconsider any planned travel through bush fire areas.

#### **RED – CATASTROPHIC**

For your survival, leave bush fire risk areas

These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire. Your life may depend on the decisions you make, even before there is a fire. Stay safe by going to a more secure location early in the morning or the night before. Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions. You may not be able to leave, and help may not be available. **TOTAL FIRE BANS** 

Fire danger ratings and Total

Fire Bans are determined by the Rural Fire Service each afternoon for the following day.

On days of elevated fire danger, a Total Fire Ban may be declared. During a Total Fire Ban, individuals cannot light, maintain, or use a fire in the open; nor carry out any activity in the open if that causes, or is likely to cause, a fire.

# Guyra water gets tick of approval

While the warmer weather has seen an increase in the natural occurrence of Blue Green Algae (BGA), Armidale Regional Council (ARC) says that Guyra residents can rest assured that their drinking water is free from toxicity and safe for consumption.

According to the 2024 Drinking Water Monitoring Report which was released on December 19, 2024, the Guyra water supply fully complies with the national drinking water guidelines.

ARC said based on the report's results, the Guyra water system has received the "tick of approval," confirming that the water treated at the Guyra Water Treatment Plant (WTP) is safe.

Routine water sampling and testing has been conducted, following the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines (2011), covering physical, chemical, and microbiological characteristics, including the presence of E. coli.

The pontoon at Malpas Dam -

which had broken loose in early 2024, rendering the pipeline inoperable – has also been fixed. The pontoon houses the extraction pump for the Malpas to Guyra Pipeline and water from Malpas Dam serves as a backup water source for the Guyra WTP in case Guyra Dam runs dry.

While Guyra and Malpas dams are still on Red Alert for BGA,

ARC is doing everything possible to reassure residents their drinking water has been tested and continues to be safe.

Residents connected to Raw Water (raw water is defined as water that has not undergone treatment at a Treatment Plant) are advised not to use this water for domestic or livestock purposes during this algal alert as the algae is toxic at these levels.

Recreational activities at Malpas Dam, such as fishing, kayaking, and similar activities, are not recommended until further notice.



## 2024 - Guyra's second warmest year on record



2024 was Australia's second warmest year on record, and it was also Guyra's second warmest on record.

Looking at 86 complete years of data collected since 1911, the mean temperature for the year exceeded the long term average by 1.26C.

Temperatures were above average in all months except July. The warmest year on record was the drought year of 2019 with the mean temperature exceeding the long term average by 1.50C. Rainfall for 2024 was 51mm lower than average with a total of 826.6 mm at the official weather station located at the Guyra MPS.

Much of the shortfall came at the end of the year with December rainfall 45mm below average.



### **Council reaps rewards from new energy contract**

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is set to make significant savings of more than \$250,000 after signing a new green energy agreement with Origin Zero.

The new agreement aligns with Council's Renewable Energy Action Plan (REAP) goals ensuring ARC is taking a proactive stance in relation to climate change and seeking to address emissions both within the organisation and through leadership within and support of the community.

Council's current contract for Large Site Electricity and Street Lighting is due to expire on December 31, 2024 and it has traditionally partaken in a group tender process run by Local Government Procurement (LGP) on behalf of participating NSW Councils. In the past, this has resulted in a beneficial financial rate based on the buying power of the many participating Councils.

However, due to the group buy limiting flexibility in contract terms, changes in the energy market and the national supply and demand issues, the cost of electricity had quadrupled for Councils. This was despite the group initiative, with the likelihood of more volatility to come in the future.



ARC undertook to 'go it alone' with a direct to market approach, by first conducting an Expression of Interest (EOI) and then entering into a tender process to secure better value from the market. Importantly, the scope included by seeking a renewable retail energy supplier and renewables transi-

### Farmers urged to take part in trial of farm fire units

Under a NSW Government trial in place until 31 March, private farm vehicles used for firefighting purposes known as Farm Fire Units – or Farm Fire Fighting Vehicles (FFFVs) – can be used unregistered under certain conditions.

NSW Farmers Business Economics and Trade Committee Chair John Lowe says the catastrophic damage caused by bushfires overseas was a reminder of the importance of having key firefighting tools available in emergency situations.

"These out of season bushfires are burning out of control in the United States, and they're nothing if not a stark reminder of how fires here in NSW can get out of hand if we don't have the right tools available locally," Mr Lowe said.

"Farm Fire Units play a key role in firefighting efforts in our rural communities, and a trial of these units will be key to ensuring we can find a permanent pathway to using these units legally and under the protection of third-party insurance.

"Stopping fires as quickly as we can is critical, and Farm Fire Units have been a proven cornerstone to fast bushfire control, year in, year out on-farm." As the state's bushfire season continued, Mr Lowe urged farmers in NSW to nominate eligible vehicles to participate in the trial and support efforts to secure a more permanent solution for the use of the vehicles.

"If you've got a vehicle that's in a safe operating condition and has firefighting equipment permanently attached, then?we strongly encourage you to nominate it for the trial as soon as possible," Mr Lowe said.

"Farmers deserve to have as many tools in the toolbox available to fight fires safely and effectively, and this trial will take us one step closer to ensuring that.

"Preventing the devastation we've seen overseas and in our own country, in years not long past, is something we want to avoid at all costs."

"This new energy agreement marks a significant step towards a sustainable future for our community," said ARC Mayor Sam Coupland.

"By securing a more flexible contract that now includes 100% renewable energy, we are not only honouring our Renewable Energy Action Plan (REAP) and Project Zero 30 commitments, but also making a real difference in our environmental impact.

"This agreement is an important step in ensuring we deliver on our promises to the community, drive sustainability, and make cost-effective choices that benefit everyone.

"The use of the 100% renewable energy will also result in 2000-plus tonnes of carbon reduction. It's a win for both our economy and the planet."

### Have a say on proposed coach timetable changes

Residents in the north west community are being invited to have a say on proposed NSW TrainLink coach timetable changes that are due to come into effect in mid-2026 to better meet the needs of the travelling public.

NSW TrainLink is the state's long distance regional public transport provider. Its coach network services an area including Armidale, Guyra, Wee Waa, Moree, Inverell, Tamworth, Glen Innes, Tenterfield and Walcha, connecting communities and providing links to rail services and larger centres.

The proposed changes to NSW TrainLink coach services include adjusted timetables to meet passenger needs, new routes, additional services on some existing routes, new stops to improve local access and connections to rail and reduced travel times.

A new route is proposed to operate on Tuesday, Friday and Sunday between Armidale and Port Macquarie and return, providing an Armidale to North Coast connection for the first time. At Wauchope the coach connects with rail services giving access to and from Coffs Harbour, Grafton, the Northern Rivers, Gold Coast and Bris-

### Arrest made following fire station break and enters

A man has faced court over alleged break, enter and steal offences at two fire stations in the New England. In November 2024, New England Police District commenced an investigation into two break and enters at fire stations at Yarrowyck and Guvra.

Between Thursday 21 November 2024 and Friday 22 November 2024, a man allegedly broke into the fire station on thunderbolts Way, Yarrowyck, before he allegedly stole a number of tools from two fire engines.

Meanwhile, just after 8pm on Saturday 19 October 2024, a man allegedly entered a fire station on Langford Road, Guyra, before he allegedly stole a number of tools and electric devices from the premises.

Initial inquiries alleged the two incidents are linked.

Police established multiple crime scenes and commenced an investigation into the incident.

Following extensive inquiries, about 10.20am Thursday, 9 January, police arrested a 36-year-old man at an address on Ryanda Street, Guyra.

Police also seized items believed to be stolen from the two fire stations along with a small amount of an illegal drug which police will allege to be Methamphetamine.

He was taken to Armidale Police Station where he was charged with break and enter, and stealing value less than or equal to \$60,000 (two counts).

He was refused bail at Armidale Local Court on Friday, 10 January, and will reappear in on Monday, 10 February.

A new Monday to Friday dayreturn service is proposed be-Tamworth tween and Newcastle, via rail interchange at Muswellbrook.

The popular route between Tamworth and Dubbo and return would increase in frequency to three times per week.

In Armidale, there would be a

new CBD stop for services to and from Tenterfield and Inverell, giving passengers closer access to retail, health and education facilities.

The planned changes are based on extensive community and stakeholder feedback from a range of sources including regular customer and operator feedback, and the NSW Bus Taskforce. The proposed coach timetable would not impact train times or services.

Following public consultation, a final service plan will be developed and coach operators will be able to apply for new NSW TrainLink contracts that are proposed to take effect from mid 2026.
