Funding for new trainee roles

Armidale Regional Council has been successful in securing NSW Government funding for two new trainee positions.

The Office of Local Government's Apprentice, Trainee and Cadet Program Funding provides direct funding to councils for the development of sustainable workforces through recruitment of trainees, apprentices and cadets.

With the 'fresh start' funding, council will recruit a Trainee Educator for Guyra Long Daycare and Preschool and a Trainee Revenue Officer to join Armidale Regional Council's finance team.

"This is great news for council, but also for our region," said Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland.

"New opportunities for young people to find employment and training without leaving the region are invaluable. This funding enables council to create and offer new roles that will contribute to the growth of our region's skilled workforce."

A shortage of skilled labour, compounded by limited local training and skills development opportunities, is an ongoing challenge for communities across regional New South Wales – including as a barrier to

service delivery, and the construction of new housing and infrastructure.

By developing opportunities that grow a skilled local workforce, council is playing a key role in building better communities.

"Councils have traditionally been an employer of choice for young people," Mayor Coupland said.

"We intend that will be the case in the future!"





Industry networking and advice at Feeder Steer School

Beef producers will have the chance to build industry networks and improve their skills in the breeding, feeding and management of cattle bound for feedlots this February at the Feeder Steer School in Armidale.

Tailored for feeder steer producers, the conference will feature hands-on workshops and practical advice from leading industry research agencies, buyers, agronomists, meat scientists and livestock operation managers. The event will be held over three days between Monday 10th and Thursday 13th February at the University of New England (UNE).

The Northern Tablelands Local Land Services event will be hosted in partnership with UNE, NSW

Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development and CSIRO supported by AgSTAR Projects. Attendees can expect to hear about genetic selection, pasture management and improvement, yard weaning and pre-feedlot nutrition, carcass data and cattle transport.

Sara Paton, Land Services Offi-



cer at Northern Tablelands Local Land Services said that the conference was designed to provide beef producers with the skills and knowledge required to meet the needs of the market and ensure that cattle are feedlot ready.

"We've got a great cross section of speakers from across the sector giving up their time to arm producers with the latest advice," she said. "The event also provides some great opportunities for producers to broaden their network amongst the industry", said Ms Paton.

This year the event will feature workshops and presentations from Meat & Livestock Australia, Teys, Angus Australia, CSIRO, Jeff House Livestock, Apiam Animal Health, NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, UNE and Northern Tablelands Local Land Services.

Accommodation and meals for

participants will be available at UNE's Duval College. Tickets for the full registration range from \$450-\$550, while the single day packages begin at \$200.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra sheep & lamb sale

January 14th – First sale back for 2025. Total yarding of approximately 7500 consisting of 5000 lambs and 2500 sheep.

The best of the heavy export lambs made from %190 to \$210 which was a bit cheaper than the last sale. A good line of 520 second cross lambs, approx. 30 kg, ranged from \$88 up to \$115 averaging \$110.

Best crossbred wethers made \$120 which was still cheaper than last year

Medium weight merinos made from \$65 to \$75 depending on skin and condition.

Lighter weight merinos made from \$35 up to \$55 depending on condition and quality

Sheep sales will be on weekly from now on until further notice.

Armidale Cattle Sale

January 16th - Total yarding 2160 up 1660 on the previous sale. In what was the largest penning in quite some time vearlings and cows were well represented. There was a fair supply of grown steers and heifers along with the first of the early weaners. The quality of the offering was fair to very good while condition varied greatly. The regular buvers were in attendance. Restocker demand was strong for good quality young cattle with the steer weaners selling particularly well. The heifer portion were also keenly sought. Plain quality yearling steers in all categories were harder to sell and attracted less competition than the better quality lines. Market trends were dearer through all weight classes when compared to pre Christmas levels. Heifer yearlings also attracted strong competition

with demand from restocker and feedlot orders strong. Once again the better quality lines were keenly sought while secondary and plain quality heifers were discounted considerably. A small number of well finished heavy grown steers showed strong improvement as did the well finished grown heifers purchased by processors. Processor demand for cows was very strong with market trends also showing strong gains. Heavy bulls were also dearer.

Weekly Wool Market

January 16th - The wool market returned this week after the Christmas recess with buyers generally optimistic of a positive opening. A stronger US currency over the Christmas / New Year period led to our dollar falling by 1.4% compared to the level at our last sale prior to the recess. This provided exporters with an

opportunity to not only write some new business but also to sell down some of their inventory of held stock. This led to tense competition from the opening lot on Tuesday and continued throughout the week with price gains recorded across all types. 44,434 bales were offered with 42,537 bales sold. Merino Fleece types gained 30 to 50 cents, whilst sought after skirtings of between 18-20 micron rose as much as 50 cents. The Crossbred sector was solid with selections of 27-to-32-micron fleece sold in seller's favour improving by up to 15 cents. With such a positive start to the year, it is hoped that this beginning forms the catalyst for a better year ahead. With Chinese New Year and the Trump inauguration around the corner, the next few weeks will provide an interesting period for the wool market.

Improved water access for property firefighting

.During a fire emergency, a landholder can now take water from surface and groundwater sources on their land without needing to have a water licence and water use approval, and this includes streams, creeks and rivers abutting a boundary.

This water can be used by landholders on their property and adjacent land to fight fires, and can also be used for training and controlled burning when carried out under the authority of a firefighting agency such as the NSW Rural Fire Service.

This exemption has been made via amendments to the Water Management (General) Regulation 2018, in what the NSW Government has described a commonsense reduction in red tape to improve the ability of farmers to fight fires on their own properties.

Under the change, landholders who wish to prepare for the threat of bushfires can now also lawfully

take water and store it in a tank or dam for future firefighting purposes.

The maximum volume allowed for each property is 100,000 litres (0.1 ML) per year.

The NSW government will

carry out targeted periodic surveys of landholders to monitor how the exemption is being used.

While landholders will not be required to submit reports, they are encouraged to log the volume of water they take under the exemption, for their own records.

Emergency Services Minister Jihad Dib said the change will further empower landholders to deal with a fire threat.




