# Canteen's Healthy Transformation recognised

Guyra Central's canteen was named runners-up at the prestigious 2024 Jamie Oliver Food Hero Awards, out of more than 1,200 nominations for their category.

The awards recognise people, and initiatives that are creating a better, healthier, happier world for children through food.

The canteen has undergone a transformation over the past five years, thanks to the work of canteen manager Salli Geere and her assistant Louise Wadley.

They undertook an overhaul of the menu in order to meet the Healthy Canteen Guidelines set by the Department of Education, which requires a menu made up of at least 75% healthy options.

But for Salli, sticking to the guidelines wasn't enough—she pushed herself to provide even more variety and healthier choices than required. They have moved away from the pre-packaged and tray-baked foods and now prepare everything fresh.

One of the highlights of the can-

teen's transformation is the new focus on fresh, prepared-to-order meals. With items such as homemade pizzas, sushi, wraps, and salads, the menu now offers more than just typical canteen fare.

Salli and Louise are also committed to reducing waste, with leftovers repurposed into new meals. There is only a minimal amount of waste which is in turn fed to animals at the school farm. They're also striving to ensure that their meals cater to various dietary needs.

With fewer volunteers, due in part to the effects of drought, and the lingering impact of COVID-19, running the canteen is not without its challenges.

Despite theses setbacks Salli and Louise have continued to push forward with the support of the school community. On any given day, they may prepare meals for up to 100 students. And while Fridays are still "lunch order day," the canteen is an essential part of the school's daily routine.

The menu has something for everyone, from tandoori chicken wraps and fruit muffins to winter comfort foods like curry and lasagna.

For Salli and Louise, the recognition from the Food Hero Awards is gratifying, but the real reward comes from knowing that their work has made a positive impact on the students.

"Some of the kids rely on the canteen for their primary meal of the day, and it's important to us that it's healthy and nutritious," Salli said.

"The kids have so many more options now, and it's been great to see them embrace these changes.

"In a small country town like Guyra, recognition goes a long way and encourages us to keep trying to promote better eating habits."

# Rail trail supporters are ready to assist

Rail Trail supporter group, Friends of the New England Rail Trail (FofNERT), remain hopeful the project will move forward and say they remain committed and ready to assist with advocacy, events, promotion, and volunteer efforts to support the delivery of the New England Rail Trail.

It follows the response from the NSW government to a recent question on the possible return to rail services on Great Northern Rail Line.

The Minister for Jobs and Tourism representing the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads responded to a question by The Hon Aileen MacDonald OAM MLC saying:

"Transport for NSW does not have any current plans, funding allocations, nor strategic priorities to restore train services on the Great Northern Railway Line north of Armidale."

FofNERT say there is now no apparent impediment to the New England region moving forward with the construction of the New England Rail Trail.

Greg Wild, Chair of FofNERT, welcomed the news saying he believes it's now clear that rail services won't return to the line in the foreseeable future.

"This marks a clear opportunity for the region to repurpose the disused rail corridor into the New England Rail Trail," Mr Wild said.

"It paves the way for a worldclass rail trail that would bring significant economic, tourism, recreational and social benefits to the region," Wild said.

"The rail trail will honour the legacy of the Great Northern Railway by transforming it into a vibrant community asset, while preserving the corridor for any potential future transport needs.

"This is a once-in-a-generation chance to bring lasting benefits to our region."

The project has gained support from within the local community, including almost 7,000 signatures on a petition to support the project, and the formation of Friends of New England Rail Trail with over 180 financial members.



# Rural Market Reports

# Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

**January 28th** - A brighter market with a few less numbers yarded.

Lambs - The best on offer made up to \$250. Trade lambs made up to \$200 Best of the new season stores made from \$90 to \$136

Mutton - Medium weight crossbreds made from \$80 to \$120 . There was a big run of merino sheep on offer. Medium weights made from \$65 to \$85 and lighter weights made from \$30 to \$50

#### **Armidale Cattle Sale**

January 30th – Total yarding 1540, a reduction in supply by 600 head. The quality and condition of the offering was generally not as good as the previous sale. The exception

being some very good heavy weight cows.

There were limited numbers of well finished cattle to suit processors. Processor demand was weaker and there were less participants. The usual feedlot orders were in place along with some extra competition.

The quality of the young cattle was a major factor in the significant price changes that were mainly in the negative. Market trends through the young cattle to restock and feed were generally cheaper. There were however isolated sales in both the steers and the heifers that held up reasonably well.

There were odd pens of grown steers and heifers suitable to feed that also held up close to levels of the last sale. Generally however market trends were cheaper. Limited availability and a lack of compe-

tition saw well finished grown steers and heifers to process much cheaper.

Significantly cheaper trends through the cow market with limited processor competition. Heavy bulls were also much cheaper.

## Weekly Wool Market

January 31st - Sales were held on a Tuesday/Thursday format this week to allow for Wednesday's Chinese New Year holiday. A large fall in the size of the national offering was not enough to drive the market much higher.

Small single digit gains were made over both selling days with the rise in the overall market almost mirroring the change in currency conversion between the Aussie dollar and the US.

The crossbred sector was the

standout with the 28 micron indictor climbing almost 10% for the week and 25% dearer than the corresponding sale last season

The headline market indicators managed to just set a new seasonal high with all types 20 micron and broader trading at 18 month highs.

31,479 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 5.9%. Major buyers included Endeavour Wool, Techwool and PJ Morris with an even spread of purchases across the top 4. In a positive for next week the Fremantle market closed stronger than the Eastern seaboard.

Quantities on offer look set to rise to around 40,000 bales per week over the next fortnight which is on par with last season.

What's not on par is the 176,000 fewer bales offered for the season to date.
